

The **Pattern** Report

A free, factual account of what the public record already shows about an industrial organisation's safety history.

Given away permanently. No gated version, no paid tier. Internal name: the Exposure Report.

FREE

permanently

A company should not have to buy the right to see its own public record.

The record was **always there**

Industrial incidents are among the most thoroughly documented events in commercial life. And yet the same patterns recur inside the same organisations.

Investigations are bounded by design

A report examines one event. Doing it well needs depth, not breadth. Comparison across events is outside its terms of reference.

The record is fragmented

Regulators, investigation bodies, filings and trade press each hold a fragment, in different formats, with no shared identifier.

Internal assembly is discouraged

A document listing your own events and noting their similarity is a liability exhibit. The incentive to write it is negative.

External assembly reads as attack

When a competitor or campaigner assembles it, the organisation defends rather than examines. Same information, different reception.

The information problem was solved decades ago. The assembly problem was never anyone's job.

Facts, and one question

Record of incidents	Documented events — date, facility, event type, outcome, source. No interpretation of blame.
Regulatory history	Enforcement actions, citations, consent orders, cited to the issuing authority.
Pattern observed	Where events share a task family — three events involving isolation — the recurrence is stated. The section it is named for.
Comparable events elsewhere	The same pattern documented at other operators, de-identified. Context, never ranking.
Workforce indicators	Publicly posted hiring in operating roles; announced turnarounds. How many people will face unfamiliar equipment.
The seven questions	Presented as open questions, not findings. This is what the conversation is for.
Sources	Every claim traced to a public source, listed in full.

The constraints are the product

The test for every sentence: would this still be worth writing if EON sold nothing?

No inference beyond the record

If a source does not say it, the report does not say it.

No blame where an investigation has not concluded

Stating that three events involved isolation is a fact. Stating why is an investigator's job.

No customer data, ever

Public sources only. Nothing from any tenant — including the subject's own, if they are a customer.

No named individuals

Roles, never people.

No product content, pricing or capability claims

Not one line. One mention converts a public-interest document into a pitch.

No ranking against named competitors

Context, not league tables.

Six steps, one of them human

01

Target and scope

Which facilities, what date range.

02

Automated retrieval

Across regulator databases, investigation reports, filings, disclosures, postings. Every item carries its source.

03

Verification

Two independent public sources, or one authoritative source — regulator, investigator, or the company's own disclosure. Trade press alone is not sufficient.

04

Pattern analysis

Grouping events by task family, using the Task IQ families.

05

Human review

No Pattern Report is issued without a named reviewer.

06

Delivery with correction offer

Anything shown to be wrong is corrected and the report reissued.

The correction offer is not a courtesy. It is what makes the document credible and what turns delivery into a conversation.

Two halves of one instrument

The Pattern Report and the capstone field study must be specified to hand off to each other, not duplicate.

The documentary half — first

What the public record already shows, before anyone speaks. Produced without the organisation's involvement. This is the reason for the conversation.

The human half — second

Students asking the naive questions in person, finding out which of the seven an organisation actually has. This is the conversation.

Governance

Named public owner · named reviewer per report · correction log published · free permanently, with no upgrade path. What the field study learns never enters a Pattern Report unless separately documented in a public source.
